

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The 301st Fighter Squadron was activated at Tuskegee Army
Air Field, Tuskegee, Alabama October 13, 1942, per 1tr AGO 320.2
(7-3-42) MR-M-AF, July 4, 1942. Its next higher Headquarters was the 332nd Fighter Group, also at Tuskegee. At the time no personnel was assigned to the Squadron; therefore, for the months of Oct. and Nov. 1942, there was no activity.

On the 12th of December 1942, 110 EM were assigned to the Squadron per par 1 Special Orders 10, Meadquarters, 332nd Fighter Group and operations began. Later in the Month, 24 more EM were assigned. On the 26th of the month, the Squadron received its first Officer, 2nd Lt WILLIAM M. WOMACK, 0-570847, who became the first Adjutant of the Squadron. At the end of December there were 134 EM and 1 Officer in the Squadron.

The month of March started off with 2 EM being promoted on the first day. On the 6th, 2nd Lts BANKS and WEAVER were assigned to the Group and 2nd Lt JOSEPH A. CHRISTMAS, was assigned to the Squadron, per par 2, 30 16, Hq, 332nd Fighter Group. Lt CHRISTMAS, 0-571905 was appointed Personnel Officer. On the 11th of the month, the Commanding Officer, 1st Lt CHARLES H. DEBOW, appointed 2nd Lts WILLIAM M. WOMACK and ROLAND H. DANIELS to assist him on the Fund Council of the Squadron. Lt DANIELS was also appointed Squadron Gas Officer and Lt NORRIS was to be his assistant.

The month of March brought the Squadron its Weather Officer, 2nd Lt PAUL F. BYRD, 0-856969, who, in addition to his other duties, was appointed Asst Supply Officer. Lt COLBERT, Squadron Engineering Officer, was appointed, in addition to his other duties, Assistant Techinal Supply Officer.

STANTON, 0-796268 was assigned to the Squadron, per par 2, SO 26, Hq, 332nd Fighter Group. Two days later he was appointed Operation Officer. The month of May opened with promotions for five of our M. On the 3rd of the month, the entire Squadron moved to oscoda to join the pilots who were already there. Also, on the 3rd of the month, 2nd Lts ALFONZA W. DAVIS, 0-798944; WILMETH W. SIDAT-SINGH, 0-798952; ELMER L. GORDON, 0-798947; LEROY BOWMAN, 0-798942; and LLOYD G. SIN-LETARY, 0-798953, Flying officers, were assigned per par, 18, 30 35, Mq, 332nd Fighter Group. The activities for the remainder of the month consisted mainly of training periods for the pilots and for the ground personnel. In inclement weather ground school was held for everyone, but when it was clear, every effort was made to get as many planes into the air for as long a period of time as was possible.

On the 9th of the month the Squadron had its first tragedy. Lt SIDAT-SINGH baled out of his plane while over Lake Huron. Although he was seen to leave the plane, his body was not recovered until the latter part of June and it was in such a condition that the immediate cause of death could not be determined.

Our first period of training at Oscoda was fast drawing to a close as the month of July opened. With the help of a very efficient ground crew, the pilots had been able to get an enormous amount of time in the air and through their excellent marksmanship, had been able to set a few records in Aerial Gunnery, but, for the most part, the were tired and anxious to see their training at Oscoda completed.

On the first day of the month, 2nd Lts MAURICE V. ESTERS, 0-804550, JOSEPH P. GOMER, 0-804552, and JOHN L. HAMILTON, 0-15700, Flying Officers, reported to the Commanding Officer for their assignment into the Squadron, per par 1, SO 61. Also on the first, the Squadron received an exchange of Armament Officers. Lt EXUM was releived from duty and replaced by 2nd Lt THOMAS H. PORTER, 0-1552959, per par 10, SO 61. February was quite a month for the Squadron. It brought us a bit of joy and a bit of sorrow. It brought us our new Commender and took away our old.

Above all, it gave us an idea of just what our life in cembat would be like.

On the 3rd Capt DeBow was confined to the hospital, and It Rayford, cur Operations Officer, took over command in his, Capt DeBow's absence.

On the 7th the organization broke camp at Taranto and proceeded by motor convoy to Montecorvino Airdrome, arriving there and setting up its new camp, the following morning.

The 9th brought five of our pilots back into the Squadron. 1st it ARMAUR G. McDANIEL, and 2nd its JOSEPH P. GOMER, HARRY DANIELS, WAYNE V. One of them, Lt U.S. TAYLOR, was forced to bail out in the sea. Luckily, he was picked up by a motor launch, after staying in the water for a little less than an hour, and taken to a hospital where he was treated for shock and exposure. Another, Lt LANGSTON, had quite a bit of difficulty with his plane, going into spin after spin. Finally he decided to jump but just when he was about to leave the plane, he spotted the coast line through the soup, righted his plane, and landed at Pompeii, sans door. The third man, Lt WIGGINS, managed to get back to the base without a mishap. The fourth man, Lt HARRY DANIELS, was lost soon after they got into the bad weather, and no trace of either he or his plane has been found since. It DANIELS was a very likeable fellow, and the entire Squadron grieved his loss.

The Squadron received its first sail on the 25th. All cares and worries were forgotten for the day.

It PAUL F. BYRD, our Westher Officer was wounded by an accidentally discharged pistol, as usual, an unloaded gun. It BYRD is now confined to the hospital, but he will recover. Wesneyhile we have no weather in our Squadron.

at 0200 hours on the 15th, Enemy sircraft (flew over our area. Inti-circraft ours blasted the posseful stillness of the night for about fifteen minutes. They told us about it the next morning. We were asleep. Fither the Squadron was very brave or very tired. In the afternoon of that same day, the Squadron had its first scramble. Its MIGGINS and GOMER attempted to intercept a Reconnaisance Flame that was seen flying around over our heads. Interception was not made.

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



1. UNIT HISTORY OF THE 301ST FIGHTER SQUADRON, 332ND FIGHTER GROUP FOR THE PERIOD 1 MAY 1944 TO 31 MAY 1944.


MAY WAS RATHER AN EVENTFUL MONTH FOR THE 301ST FIGHTER SQUADRON. QUITE A FEW CHANGES WERE MADE. A NUMBER OF REPLACE-MENTS TO THE RANKS OF OUR PILOTS WERE RECEIVED, AND THAT SMALL PERIOD OF THIRTY-ONE DAYS COST US THREE OF OUR PILOTS AND ONE GROUND OFFICER.

ON THE 5TH OF THE MONTH 1ST LT JAMES R. POLKINGHORNE WAS REPORTED MISSING FROM A STRAFING MISSION THAT WENT OVER THE GAETA POINT AREA OF CENTRAL ITALY. LT POLKINGHORNE WAS ONE OF THE MOST POPULAR OFFICERS IN THE SQUADRON, LIKED BOTH BY THE EM AND HIS FELLOW OFFICERS. ALTHOUGH HE IS STILL MISSING, WE ARE ALL KEEPING FAITH THAT HE IS SAFE.

2ND LT HENRY B. SCOTT, 0-814206, A REPLACEMENT PILOT, WAS ASSIGNED TO THE SQUADRON ON THE 6TH. LT SCOTT IS THE BROTHER OF OUR SQUADRON INTELLIGENCE OFFICER, LT SAMUEL C. SCOTT, AND A HAPPY REUNION TOOK PLACE WHEN THEY MET.

ON THE 7TH OF MAY LT ROBERT L. KING WAS TRANSFERRED FROM THE SQUADRON AND ASSIGNED TO HEADQUARTERS, 332ND FIGHTER GROUP. LT KING HAD BEEN OUR COMMUNICATIONS OFFICER UNTIL THAT TIME. ON THE 8TH, LT WILLIAM M. MOULDEN WAS TRANSFERRED IN FROM THE 302ND FIGHTER SQUADRON. LT MOULDEN WAS LATER APPOINTED PERSONAL EQUIPMENT OFFICER AND ACTING COMMUNICATIONS OFFICER.

ON THE 9TH OF THE MONTH LT CLAUDE B. GOVAN WAS APPOINTED SUMMARY COURT OFFICER IN THE CASE OF LT JAMES R. POLKINGHORNE.



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THE 12TH OF THE MONTH BROUGHT EIGHT MORE PILOTS TO THE SQUADRON. 2ND LTS CLARENCE H. BRADFORD, O-817581, ROBERT H. DANIELS JR, O-817582, OTHEL DICKSON, O-817583, ROBERT J. FRIEND, O-817584, FREDERICK D. FUNDERBURG, O-817585, LLOYD S. HATHCOCK, O-817589 WERE ASSIGNED TO THE SQUADRON, PER PAR 3, SO #40, HQ, 332ND FIGHTER GROUP.

LT COMMIE WILSON, OUR SUPPLY OFFICER, WHILE CLEANING A HAT IN HIS TENT, WAS SEVERELY BURNED ABOUT THE FACE AND HANDS BY A GASOLINE FIRE ON THE 14TH OF THE MONTH. HE WAS CONFINED TO THE HOSPITAL, AND AT THE TIME OF THIS WRITING, IS STILL BEING TREATED FOR HIS BURNS.

ON THE 19TH, THE SQUADRON HAD ANOTHER ACCIDENT. LT DICKSON, ONE OF THE NEW PILOTS, WHILE TRANSITIONING INTO P-47, BELLY-LANDED HIS PLANE, TOTALLY WRECKING IT. LT DICKSON WALKED-AWAY.

THE ENTIRE 332ND FIGHTER GROUP, ON THE 22ND OF THE MONTH, WAS RELIEVED FROM ITS ASSIGNMENT WITH THE XII AIR FORCE AND ASSIGNED FOR DUTY TO THE XV AIR FORCE, PER GO #28, HQ, AAF, MTO, DATED 22 MAY 1944.

ON THE 24TH, ANOTHER OF OUR PILOTS WAS REPORTED MISSING. LT JOHN PROWELL, VERY POPULAR AMONG THE MEN OF OUR ORGANIZATION, WHILE ON A CONVOY ESCORT MISSION, HAD ENGINE TROUBLE DEVELOP IN HIS PLANE AND WAS FORCED TO BAIL OUT. AIR SEA RESCUE WAS SENT OUT. HIS DINGHY WAS PICKED UP, BUT NO TRACE OF LT PROWELL WAS FOUND. ON THE SAME DAY, LT VIRGIL RICHARDSON, RETURNING FROM THE SEARCH FOR LT PROWELL, LANDED INTO A FLOCK OF SHEEP. HIS PLANE WAS COMPLETELY DEMOLISHED. TWENTY-THREE SHEEP WERE KILLED. LT RICHARDSON RECEIVED MINOR INJURIES TO HIS FACE AND HANDS.

ON THE 25TH, THE ADVANCE ECHELON OF THE SQUADRON, COMMANDED BY LT LAWRENCE DOOLEY, LEFT MONTECORVINO TO SET UP ITS NEW CAMP AT RAMITELLI AIRDROME. THEY WERE JOINED BY THE REST OF THE SQUADRON ON THE 30TH OF THE MONTH.

LT LLOYD S. HATHCOCK, WHILE FERRYING ONE OF OUR PLANES FROM MONTECORVINO TO RAMITELLI ON THE 29TH, WAS LOST, AND HAS NOT BEEN HEARD FROM SINCE. IT IS STILL A MYSTERY AS TO WHAT HAPPENED TO HIM.

DURING THE MONTH, THE SQUADRON WAS CARRYING ON ITS USUAL DUTIES OF ESCORTING CONVOYS, BUT EVERY NOW AND THEN, A SCRAMBLE OR AN AIR SEA RESCUE WAS THROWN IN, AND ONCE THE SQUADRON WAS SENT ON A STRAFING MISSION OVER ENEMY LINES.

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THE TOTAL FLYING TIME FOR THE MONTH WAS 812 HOURS AND 13 MINUTES, 570 HOURS AND 38 MINUTES OF THAT TIME BEING OPERATIONAL.

THE MONTH CLOSED WITH THE SQUADRON'S STRENGTH AT 49 OFFICERS AND 255 EM.







Immediately fellowing activation of the new 301st Fighter Squadren (32) (*1) the primary mission of the unit was transition training to single engine aircraft for the twin engine silets. This meant much more than it seems on the surface. Personnel had to be shifted within the squadren to meet the demands of a fighter squadren. Surplus personnel had to be transferred to other units on the base. Shertages in many TO & E (*2) positions had to be filled. And in many cases, these positions had to be filled by men with inadequate training. This fact mecossitated an efficient on-the-job-training program. The personnel who had been keeping B-25's flying new had to keep P-47N's and AT6's flying. It was certainly no easy task.

PERSONNEL

Beginning this quarter with a serious shortage of trained personnel, the squadron began a well-planned on-the-jeb-training program. To aid the squadron in earrying out its mission, six (6) 1055's were transferred to the unit (*6) as instructor pilets for AT6's. Only one of those pilets is qualified to give instrument instruction. The rest of the instructor pilets (5) were used as transition instructors to familiarize former twin engine pilets with single engine aircraft.

In the furtherance of the training of personnel to qualify them to perform a job better, only five (5) officers and one enlisted man were sent to various service schools (*7). Captain Fitzrey Newsum is on TDY for twenty-eight (28) weeks taking a Communications course at Scott Field, Illinois; lst Lt. Hareld M. Hillery is also on TDY at Scott Field for nine (5) weeks.

1st Lt. Edward J. Williams is taking a fighter gunnery course at Williams Field, Arizona. 1st Lt. William D. Phears is at the Air Forces Institute of Technology for two (2) years at Wright Field, Ohio. Captain Theordere Wilson (1055) attended a two weeks course in Engine Conditioning classes at Olmsted Field, Middletowa, Fa. 1st Lt. Lee Archer was transferred from the squadron to the

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Air University, Maxwell Field, Alasana. Lt. Archer will attend the University of Seuthern California at Les Angeles for two years. One (1) 35% 911 is attending Gun Turret School at Lewry Field, Denver, Colorado. All officers of the squadron having designated their choice of schools are awaiting quotas.

The relief from flying status of twenty-one (21) enlisted men in the squadren caused a definite lewering of the merale of the entire squadren (*8). This change was necessitated by the fact that there is no need for EM on flying status in a fighter squadren.

There were no premetions of efficer personnel during the quarter. Three (3) EMs were premeted as follows: One (1) 747 was premeted to Sgt., one (1) 750 was premeted to Sft., one (1) 911 was premeted to Pfc.

Three Ms were separated during the quarter. One (1) corporal (747), one corporal (405), and one (1) sergeant (750) failed to re-enlist when their enlistments were terminated.

Two (2) efficers received appointments in the ORC as 1st Lt. and three (3) efficers received appointments as Captains, ORC (*10).

Thirteen Reserve Officers were assigned to the squadren for active duty training for a period of two weeks (*11). Six (6) of these efficers are 1055s, three (3) are 1081s, one (1) is a 1051, one (1) a 4822 and one (1) is a 1054.

Five (5) 33N 911s were attached to the 99th Fighter Squadron (52) for rations, quarters, administration and duty (EDCMR 2 Sept 47) and five (5) 1055s were ettached to the 99th for administration and duty in order that the 99th could accomplish its mission at the Air Indoctrination Course at Lawson Field, Georgia (*12).


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The 301st has no intelligence functions except the maintenance of the security of classified written matter. This is done by the various sections concerned. The preparation of the Squadron Mistery is handled by the Squadron Misterian who coordinates with the S-2 section of the 332d Fighter Group.

Briefing of the pilots is now being accomplished by the Squadron Operations Officer.

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OPERATIONS

Operations was mainly concerned with training 1081s to become 1055s. AT6's were used as transition aircraft. The squadron received a total of six AT6's. Two of these aircraft were designated "Instrument Ships" and were used solely for instrument training. All twin-engine pilots were required to get a minimum of twenty (20) hours (including transition, formation, aerobatics, instruments) before they were eligible for check out in the P-47N. The squadron flew a total of 1005 hours during the quarter with time broken down as follows:

Average time per pilot - 45 hours, total instrument time - 56 hours, tetal night time - 97 hours, total P-47 time - 150 hours, total AT-6 time - 805 hours, total hours during ferry missions - 55 hours.

Flying safety has been consistantly stressed during the quarter. Meekly flying safety meetings have been held with a general discussion period following the reading of various accident reports from Flying Safety. The squadron experienced ne accidents with AT-6 sircraft. On 25 August, 1st Lt. Virgil Brashears had a minor accident with a P-47N. He damaged a propeller while making an emergency landing.

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Captain Vernon V. Maywood was assigned duty as operations officer (*18) at the segimning of the quarter. In a subsequent shift of personnel, Captain Richard C. Fullan took over the job as Operations Officer when Captain Maywood was assigned to duty as Deputy Commander of the Squadron (*14). Later in the quarter, 1st Lt. Ellictt M. Slue was assigned the job of Operations Officer. Due to the very few planes (six (6) AT-6's and three (3) P-47N's) in the squadron and the shortage of pilots this rapid change in personnel did not hamper operations.

PERSONAL EQUIPMENT

Personal Equipment functions have been seriously hampered in the Squadron because there wasn't a qualified Personal Equipment Technic cian (SSN 594). The squadron was fortunate in having a Parachute Rigger (SSN 920). This 920 has been transferred to the Airdrome Group leaving the squadron minus any personnel to handle Personal Equipment.



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A. ENGINEERING

In the past three months, the maintenance problem has been increased due to the addition of more aircraft to the squadron. This period was begun with five (5) AT 6 and six (6) P 47 type aircraft. At the end of this period the five AT 6 aircraft had been transferred to the 352nd Airdrome Group and the number of P 47 Aircraft had been brought to a total of twenty-five (25). However, the increased number of aircraft did not affect the efficiency of the Engineering section. Although the personnel was below T/O strength, an average of 60% of the aircraft were kept in commission. The In Commission status sections of the aircraft were kept in commission. In the latter part of November, cold weather operations began to play havoc with the "In" status. The crew cheifs and pilots alike were inexperienced in the operation of P 17 type aircraft but, after a few extremely cold mornings they began to learn through experience. In the meantime, the Engineering Officer conducted a series of classes in Cold Weather Operations and Engine Build Up for the crew chaifs and pilots. At the end of December, the status of the squadron's aircraft was twenty five (25) P17 N's assigned. (*11)

B. ARMAMENT -

As with all sections, the Armament Section operated understrength from 1 October 1947 to 31 December 1947, starting the period with ten (10) Enlisted Men and one (1) Officer. Five (5) Enlisted Men were on TDY with the 99th Fighter Sq at Myrtle Beach Air Base, S. C. It was felt that the experience and on-the-job-training received by these men made the temporary shortage to the Armament Section worthwhile.

The entire squadron fired for record on the small arms range with the 45 cal. pistol under the supervision of the Armament Officer and Section (*12) The firing was conducted on schedule and without accidents.

C. COMMUNICATIONS

The Communications Section has had a rather quiet time for the past quarter. With all new planes in the squadron there has been no necessity for major repair work. In connection with "Operations 200", sixteen (16) aircraft have been equipped with the common Ninth Air Force frequency (111.16 Megs) on Channel "Charlie". All other aircraft will be so equipped as soon as the necessary crystals are received.


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The Administrative Supply Section had no major problems during this period. Clothing at one time was a major issue but at the present, items are beginning to arrive. The replacement of salvaged items has been slow because of the length of time it takes for them to come from the depot.

The Technical Supply Section was faced with the same problem in regards to aircraft battery carts. At the present, only four (4) battery carts are available in the squadron. The Technical Supply Section is undergoing a thorough inventory and at this writing too much cannot be said about it. A full report of Supply activitites will be covered in this section of future quarterly histories.

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It was planned in this quarter that each pilot would have attained a minimum of sixty (60) hours in the P 17 type aircraft by 51 December 1947. However, because of the shortage of aircraft during the first half of this period, and because of several days of typical "Ohio Valley" winter weather, only half of the goal was attained. However, the requirements of AAF Regulation 60-2 were met 100%.

At the activation of the 301st Fighter Squadron, there were only eight (8) fighter pilots assigned. The rest of squadron was composed of bomber (B 25) pilots. While the latter were old pilots as far as flying goes, none of them had received any training at all in single engine aircraft since Basic Flight Training; so, this was a transition period for them in every same of the word. During this period, all transition accept night flying was accomplished. Now that the squadron is up to aircraft T/O strenght. the Operations Officer has set a minimum of four (4) hours flying time per day per pilot with an emphasis on squadron and group formations.

All Pilots have been made familiar with "Operations 200" now being conducted by the Ninth Air Force. The Intelligence Officer has set up a ground and air situation map and a breifing map in the breifing room so that the individual may keep abreast of day to day changes in the theatre of operations. The emphasis on squadron formations was made with an eye to future missions in conjunction with "Operations 200".

One accident occured in this quarter. A pilot on a night navigational proficiency flight in an AT 6 was returning to Lockbourne Air Base from Cleveland, Ohio on the 6th October 1947. He lost radio contact with all ground stations somewhere in the Golumbus area, and, because of ground fog blanketing the area, could not orientate himself. He elected to fly out E. T.A. and then decided to abandon the aircraft since his fuel was almost gone. While preparing to abandon the aircraft he sighted a small civilian field and attempted a landing after dragging it twice. The visibility was bad, and upon landing the left wing tip grazed a boundary post and the AT 6 nosed up. The Pilot and passenger received superficial scratches.

The next morning, a crew was sent to the scene of the accident to bring the aircraft back by truck if necessary, but a pilot who accompanied them, inspected the aircraft, pronounced the damage minor and flew the aircraft back to Lockbourne.

The accident was discussed thoroughly in group and squadron Flying Safety Meetings, but at this writing no board action has been returned from Ninth Air Force Headquarters.







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ORGANIZATION AND ADMINISTRATION

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The general erganizational framework of the Squadron has not changed in the past three menths as compared with the preceding quarter.(1) There has, however, been a shuffling of personnel in several of the administrative positions due to transfers and hospitalization. These changes will be explained in Chapter II.

The entire Organization was transferred to the Department of the Air Force as of 26 September 1947. All personnel assigned to this organization as of 2 January 1948 have been transferred to the Department of the Air Force except the following who remain assigned to the Department of the Army.

The Squadron activities during the past quarter were for the most part centered around compliance with the 9th AF's Accelerated Training Program (%) designed to standardize the duties of all Air Force Personnel and generally raise the preficiency level. Flying was forced to take a back seat to this program which entailed long hours of lectures and general instruction by skilled personnel.

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Technical Supply

The technical supply section has done a magnificent jeb despite the fact that all of the personnel are untrained. The section is authorized one 835 and one 826.(18) These men were not available, therefore one 748 and one 747 were taken from the Engineering section and given on-the-jeb training. They are both rated semi-skilled at present.

The section has all $T/O\!k\!E$ equipment that is authorized except for a few items of mechanics tools that are not available to the command at present.

Administrative Supply

During the past three menths, little change has occured in the General Supply Section. All enlisted men have been issued additional clething mainly the cup service which takes the place of the new ebselete, cap, garrison.

T/O & E items have been received steadily during the past three menths bringing our total and average percentage up to 91.8%.

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Engineering

The engineering section has been functioning smoothly under the able guidance and supervision of Captain Theodore Wilson in spite of the handicap of personnel shortages. The section is short seven crew chiefs (750), two sheetmetal workers (555), an instrument specialist (686), clerk (055) and a paint and dope man (144).

During the period the section has been engage in an engine reconditioning program that has resulted in the reconditioning of twentythree engines while one engine is in the process. The program has been hampered by damp weather which provents final carbureter adjustments, and by the presence of only one magic wand and one co pression tester in the entire Fighter Group.

The large out-status as shown on the 15 and 29 of Feb and 31 Mar can be attributed to the engine conditioning and, routine inspections.

By percentage the in-commission status was highest for January (94%) and drop ing to its lowest point (17%) in February.

Armament

The armament section has completed beresighting of the guns on 18 aircraft in preparation for a proposed gunnary course senetime this spring.

Classes have been held in familiarization in small arms and all personnel assigned to the squadron has completed firing on the range both for familiarization and record as cutlined in AR 7-75-10. This firing was accomplished without an accident.

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Communications

The communications section has been engaged in routine inspand minor repair work, during this period. Their work has been he by a shortage of test equipment and spare parts that have been on equisition since July 1947. There are no crystals at all for 7350 K transmitters and 820 KC receivers. These items have been on requisi since November 1947 but are not available to the command.


Mine aircraft are equipped with modified AN/ARC -3 (8 channel) radio sets. All aircraft assigned are on work orders for this equipment.

The section is up to T/O strength and the morale is generally ${\tt good}$.



In conjunction with the above it must be remembered that other duties prohibited some personnel from flying as much as others. The usual number of pilets available daily average about twelvs.

During the period this organization participated in five 9th AF missions in conjunction with "Operation 200."

One of two accidents for this period, occured on an "Operation 200" mission. (20) Lt William B Ellis bailed outs of his plane after experiencing engine trouble under instrument conditions. Lt Ellis was unburt but the plane was demolished.

The other accident occured on a local flight when Lt E. J. Williams made a wheels down forced landing after experiencing trouble with his gear followed by engine failure.

The operational effectiveness of the squadron was decreased by the temp. transfer of Captain Alva N. Temple to Williams Field, Arizona for a course in fighter gumnery (21)

The general curricula for flying training included formation, high altitude formation, corss-country and navigation missions, and two nights of night-flying.

As a result of the above, all pilets, except Lt Alvin Harrison, who has just checked out in the P-47 aircraft are 50% trained. All pilets have completed 75% of the I Phase of Training as outlined in 9AF training directive 10-1, with the exception of the bembing and gunnery phases.

The en-the-jeb training program has been progressing favorably under the guidance of Lt Herman Campbell and S/Sgt James McGrae.

Treep Information (22) accomplished once weekly under the supervision of the Squadron Treep Information and Education Officer.


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




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CHAPTER I

AR AMENS

The month of April was spent in preparing our ships for Gunnery at Eglin Field. Our greatest difficulty in this task was supply. The fact that Air Corps Supply does not keep a stock level on arrament equipment makes it extremely difficult to prepare for any extended mission.

We are also handicapped by a lack of trained personnel. The munber of armorers allowed the existing T.O. is grossly inadequate.

The squadron a rived at Sglin Aux #6 on the 18th of May and egan actual operation on the 19th of May. By the 1st of June we had completed actual firing.

The armament section loaded a total of 128, 427 rounds and a total of 104,158 rounds were actually fired. The biggest single day was the 20th of ay, when a total of 17,305 rounds were fired.

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CHAPTER IV

SUPPLY AND EQUIPMENT

Operation of the Solst Pighter Squadron General Supply has entailed much work and effort on the part of the personnel assigned due to the changing of the T/O & E. All shortages of new equipment have been requisitioned and are coming in very rapidly. At the time of the writing of the History, the squadron had 80% of T/O & E property.

All excess of equipment due to the changing of T/0's has been , transferred to other organizations and the palance turned in to Dase Supply.

There have few changes in supply procedures. The most important one is Wing Regulation 67-12 Salvage procedures. This regulation specifies the use of 332nd Fighter Wing Ferm \$4. It is felt by this section that this form is not practicable and should be revised.

The Tochnical Supply Section has placed priorty #3 requisitions with Air Corps Supply for Republic Aircraft parts, class Ol-W.

The manufacture of P-47N aircraft parts has been stopped and dir Corps Supply Depots find it extremely difficult to get certain parts that have ordered because of this.

One inhisted Man, Cpl. Richard C. Manilton has been added to Tech-Supply and is of great help to the section. This man is learning the procedures of Tech Supply very rapidly.

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CHAPTER V

During the past quarter the squadron has participated in five Oth AF Missions in conjunction with Operation 200.

The squadron was engaged also in the joint maneuvers "Operations Assembly" during the month of May St Campbell, Kentucky and flew four maximum effort missions on four successive days.

We also coordinated with the S9th Fighter Squadron in participating in a demonstration with the armored school at Fort Knox, Kentucky during the month of April.

For approximately 14 days during the month of any the Squadron went to Eglin Field Aux #6 for Gunnery training which consisted of air to air, air to ground, rocket firing, camera gunnery and dive bombing. We took a total of 13 pilots, all of whom completed the gunnery phase as outlined in 9th Air Force Training Directive 10-1.

Three accidents occurred during the period. Lt. Caniel James was on a dive bombing mission when his ele trical system failed completely. His plane flipped over on its back during the landing. Lt. Floyd Thompson crash-landed at Eglin Main after experiencing power failurs while on a guanty mission. During an emergency landing at night, Lt. Alvin Marrison noticed a flame beneath the aircraft and nosed up when he attempted to stop too suddenly. Mone of these pilots were injured.

In this reporting period, this unit has had three M return from formal school training and are now undergoing the phase of station training to obtain a sailled rating in their particular fields.


There were seven 747-D's assigned to this unit of five are on station training and two are TDY getting formal school training in related fields. There are twenty EV assigned who require station training. The average number of personnel receiving training this period was twenty-six. There are six EV who are waiting on the classification board to meet in order to complete their training. There were four EV who have either gained a skilled MOS or an additional MOS in this three month period.

At present there is a plan in effect that will enable this unit to keep a more accurate and closer supervision of all station trainees.

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



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CHAPTER I

CRUANIZATION AND ADMINISTRATION

The general organizational framework of the squadron remained unchanged during the past quarter until the 26th of August 1945. At that time the squadron was reorganized under a new Table of Organization and Equipment with the proper authority. 2/ This new T/O & E differs primarily from the old one 3/in that it has a separate strength authorization for both peace time and war time operation. It is designed to limit the number of assigned personnel that are superfluous and at the same time, to provide a firm nucleus of higher trained personnel that can be expanded rapidly in event of a national emergency. Under this new table more rank is authorized enlisted heads of sections than was authorized previously.

No specific administrative difficulties were experienced as a result of the change, however it should be noted that there is no peacetime authorization for a Deputy Commander. This situation depletes orderlyroom officer personnel, and in addition puts a heavier workload on the Adjutant.

Among the major events of the quarter was the movement of fifteen (15) officers and forty-five airmen (45) with the appropriate operational equipment to Eglin Air Force Base, Auxiliary # 7, Florida on the 30th of August 1945 to participate in Operation Combine # 3.4/

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This is a joint operation that includes the ground forces, air forces, and the navy in a gigantic rehearsal and display that is designed to improve the techniques of cooperative effort among the different branches of service. This temporary tour of duty is scheduled for approximately seventy-five (75) days and at the time of this writing, the 501st Fighter Squadron has more than contributed its share toward making the mission of the entire group a success.

The relationship between the sections of the unit has been characterized by one theme - - that of cooperation. It is felt by the command that only through cooperation among sections of the unit and among units of the group, can the mission of the group and the mission of the Tactical Air Command be accomplished with maximum effectiveness.

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CHAPTER II

PERSONNEL

The general personnel picture shows a slight increase in complement among the airmen while the officer strength remains about the same as compared with the previous quarter. While the organization has an over strength of airmen, that over strength is reflected in one MOS (747). This results in an understrength in other MOS's that affects the operating efficiency of the squadron. The shortage of four (4) officers has not been felt too keenly as all commitments from higher headquarters have been met adequately. For example - the squadron, in the past week, has participated simultaneously in three separate operations. Besides the regular Operation Combine mission, units of the squadron have given demonstrations at Lawson Field, Georgia and Codman Field, Kentucky.

The shortages in MOS's are as follows:

The most effective way to remedy this situation is to send men to the formal schools operated by the Air Training Command as the facilities for training specialists such as 555's and 275's are not adequate at squadron level. As soon as the quotas are open in the desired schools, men will be assigned so that the shortages will be eliminated. At present S/Sgt Thomas J. Simon and Pfc Roy L. Ward are engaged in on-the-job training for Supply Sergeant and Supply Clerk, respectively.

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CHAPTER III

SUPPLY AND EQUIPMENT

TECHNICAL SUPPLY

The tech- supply section is authorized a personal complement of one Tech supply NCO (826) and one supply clerk(835) . At present, while T/SGT berl Adars is doing an admirable job, there is no supply clerk in the section. There have been men assigned to this resition in the past but the discipalty is that their MOS was never chanced. Consequently when a shortage existed in their MOS, these men had to return to their primary duty leaving the section shorthanded. It is recommended that in the future a a man he assigned to this vacancy in an on the job training status and eventually be classified in the corresponding MIS. There has been an acute shortage of parts during the past three months, resulting in a number of A.O.C.P cases. In most cases the normal requisition waiting period is from three to four norths. Plaudibs should be extended to the Airmen in the section for their invenuity in samplecturing parts in some cases, in an effort to keep the planes in the air. An example of this ingenuity can be seen in the manufacture of a clamp for the exhaust housing of an F-47, the lack of which had the aircraft. A.Q.C.I 16/. To date this part has hot been received but the Aircraft in question is flying.

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The unit now has a total of twenty-five (25) aircraft assigned with sixteen (16) based at Eglin Auxiliary Field #7, Florida, since of the 30th August 1946. It should be noted that since the unit is now split into two segments, one at Lockbourne Air Force Base and the other in Florida there are two supply systems actually operating. The supply section at the home base has been sperating very smoothly during the past three months. The movement of the unit to Eglin Field required additional requisitioning, however enough advance notice was given to insure adequate preparation. Among the additional items needed for this trip were shot guns, riot guns, field desks, folding tables and chairs, typewriters, stationery and juniganitarial supplies. All the enlisted personnel have revelved new allowances 8f clothing as authorized.17/ TAA 21 War Dept, dated 7 Augl 45. Included are ponche, suspenders, trouses, caps, gloves, handkerchiefs, drawers and undershits It is felt by the section heads, that the general supply situation is better than it has been during the past year with the exception of the slowness of the Base show repair shop. The supply section will suffer a great loss . when S/Sgt Dana Myers become a civilian next month, S/Sgt Ernest Mitchell is being groomed to replace him. At Eglin Field the general supply section of the squadron has been consolidated with the supply section of the other two squadrons, and the base supply. So far this system has proved very effective.

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CHAPTER IV

MAINTENANCE

Engineering

The efficiency of the engineering section has received several severe tests during the past quarter. The success of the movement to Eglin Field followed by a high level of operating efficiency proves that the organization for maintenance as set up under Lt. Wyrain T. Schell, is very effective. This is evidenced by the fact that of the sexteen (16) aircraft based at Eglin Field, all of them are in flying condition, and available almost daily for the flying commilments of the unit. The enlisted men of this section deserve the highest praise for their effort and ingeneitly in maintaining such a satisfactory record.

The following table shows the assigned and in commission status of aircraft for the middle and end of each month.

It should be noted that the large out status for July and August can be explained in that preparations were being made for the Eglin Field trip. On the 15th of August approximately four planes were out due to T. O. Compliance. One problem that has been noncountered by the Floridaechelon is the failure of magnetos due, probably to the wamn weather.

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A total of sixteen magnetos alive been replaced during the month of September. A major problem of morale presented itself toward the last of the quarter. The airman were promised a rotation plan after the first month of Florida operation. They feel that they've done a good job in setting up there sections and that there are qualified replacements available at the home base to facilitate this proposed plan. Although the transportation problem is acute is should be noted that any extreme lowing of morale tends to not only effect the efficiency of the unit but also have some bearing on the number of re-enlistednts. Among the key personnel, these whose enlistments run out in the two months. Already discharges have deprived the unit of an inspector and a Flight Chief. If this trend continues the work load left on the remaining men will be too great to expect efficiency.

Armanment

During the months of July and August this section was busily engaged in preparations for operation combine #III. Fresh from a Spring gunnery course the armorers are well trained and efficient. All bomb racks and shackles were tested and new solenoids were installed. During the reporting period this section was well tested in operation pointed at Pope Field, N. C. in July and numerous other demonstrations at Isason Field, Ga. and Godman Field, Kentucky. At Pope Field men of this section confronted by a lack of arming wire for the bombs, manufactured their own wires, thereby accomplishing the mission. The section is authorized eleven men and is organized so that each armorer is responsible for two planes, although the section is short of qualified armorers the work is being accomplished through cooperation and fine sprit shown by the men. The section is badly in need of a continuity tester for the rockets.

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There is only one in the entire group, and it is not always available due to the widespread commitments of the group.

Communications

The communications section is hampered by the absence of S/Sgt. James
Bell who is away in school. The remaining four men are effectively prefroming their duties. During the reporting period the old 522 four channel
VHF sets were replaced in all the planes by the new ARC-3 fight channel sets

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RESTRICTED CHAPTER V TRAINING

FLYING

During the past quarter the flying training program has been somewhat hindered by numerous demonstrations, maneuvers, and air shows. The beginning of this reporting period is also the beginning of the fiscal year as outlined in AF Regulation 60-2. In spite of the interruptions the following training has been accomplished to meet the requirements of AF Reg 60-2:

Percentage of Night Flying......35%
Percentage of Total Time......48%

Credit should be given to the Operations O ficer, Capt Alva N. Temple, for pushing this program during the months of July and August as there has not been much opportunity for night and instrument flying during the month of September at Eglin Field. During the month of July this unit participated in three demonstrations missions over Columbus and two 9AF Operations #200 Missions and four bombing and strafing missions at Pope Field, S.C. in conjunction with Operations "Pointer"

The month of August saw our Group in 4 (four) Operation #200 Missions followed by the movement to Eglin #7 at the end of the month. The unit has flown 17 (seventeen) missions while at Eglin #7 during the month of September. These missions included practice and live missions with Operation Combine III, holiday air shows over Pensacola, Fla and sections of Alabama and practice and live missions at Lawson Field, Ga., in a demonstration for the Command and General Staff School.

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Dive bombing missions were assigned to the 301st and in all cases, the missions were highly successful with the pilots dropping 100 pound practice bombs and 250 and 500 pound G/P bombs. It is felt that participating in these demonstrations and maneuvers serves as additional training for pilots of the unit and tends to raise the flying proficiency level.

There is also an opportunity of a plying the live dive bombing missions toward accomplishment of the 9AF Training Directive 10-1. This would shorten the next gunnery tour of duty considerably.

No major aircraft accidents occurred during to last three months. Three planes picked up shrapnel holes in the tail surfaces due to low dive bomb runs but, these were repaired immediately without sacrifice.

While at Lockbourne during the months of July and August, weekly flying safety meetings were hild in the suadron. This procedure has been changed somewhat as the weekly meeting in Florida include pilots of the entire Fighter Group.

During the month of August, pilots of the squadron flew to Turner Field Ga for demonstration of the radar control system employed by the Tactical Air Forces Station Training

The squadron Station Training program has been interrupted quite a bit due to the various movements throughout the period. At present we have eighty-three (83) airmen skilled in their MOS, twenty (20) airmen semi-skilled in MOS.

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and four (4) men attending formal schools off the station. There are eight(3) airmen awaiting re-classification but there have no results received from the Classification Board The estimated time needed to completely train the squadron is four (4) months.

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CHAPTER VI

FACILITIES

The facilities at the home base (Lockbourne AFB, Columbus 17, 0) have not changed during the past quarter.

In Florida, the facilities are about the best available under the circumstances. The men occupy one (1) barrack with members of the 100th Fighter Squadron (SE) All of the officers of the Group are housed in two (2) buildings, two (2) officers to a room.

The food is generally good with es ential personal items can be purchased at the Post Exchange. The remote location of the base creates a recreation problem, but this is alleviated by nightly movies, softball, touch football and truck convoys to the main base and nearby towns.



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RESTRICTED CHAPTER I

ORGANIZATION AND ADMINISTRATION

The organization framework of the squadron has not changed since it was reorganized under the new table of organization and Equipment 1/ previously reported. 2/
